



Below is the statue of General John Logan in Grant Park, the Civil War General and leader of the Grand Old Army of the Republic, an organization of Union Civil War Veterans. He helped lead the call for the creation of Decoration Day which later became Memorial Day.

The playing of Taps preceded the three volley gun salute. We'd then return to the big yellow bus to head back to our school to enjoy a "Happy Memorial Day." And another classmate who, as a graduate of Westpoint, served in the military. He died earlier this year.

I would prefer to call it a "meaningful" Memorial Day.

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

### **Fear of Kudzu City**

The gardeners in the small neighborhood park I call my own, butchered the beauty out of the spring flowers and attendant bird migration. In their zeal to prune away the dead and diseased tree branches, they yanked out all non-native "invasive" species. This disrupted the seasonal pattern of our expectations. As I wandered through the other day, a neighbor with her spaniel in tow stopped me.

"What happened to our flowers?" She yelled across the boxwood.

"The gardeners mulched it all into last years' compost." I said. I don't know her, but here we were joined by a sudden mutual experience.

"They went too far! Can't you do something about it?"

Me? I must have spoken with authority about the Chicago Park District's program to remove invasive species and introduce native plants. As usual, I imparted knowledge based on next to nothing. Last summer as my allergies exploded, I read an article in the Chicago Tribune about the Park District planting more allergen-producing native plants, like goldenrod. A passing employee of the Chicago Park District once educated me on the park's introduction of native plants, especially those glorious hibiscus. And a neighbor who is a volunteer gardener at the Lincoln Park Zoo spends her summer eliminating "invasives". That's the extent of my knowledge on the subject.

"You can go to the Park District Board meetings and ask about it," was my know-it-all answer.

But Nature has once again reigned supreme in my city neighborhood. On my street, there is no human control over the crow's nest and its four chicks that are flapping around in the branches. I watch them strengthen their young wings to fly out from their birthplace and fend for themselves. Wildlife never needs permission to be. But it does need protection.

The New York Times reported this week on one of Chicago's best nature stories. The Lakeside Center at McCormick Place applied a treatment on its glass building to deter migrating birds from banging into it. Last year up to 1,000 birds died in one night at McCormick Place. This year, the deaths, due to the widow treatment, were down by 95%. Chicago's unpopular mayor should take credit. For some of us this fact alone is enough to vote for his reelection.

Unfortunately there's no treatment we can apply to protect ourselves from bumping up against the current man-made enemy that is called the United States of America. What can protect us from dirty air and water unleashed by industrial, vehicle and power plant toxins?

I envision a doomsday scenario, a post-apocalyptic environment like "the Last of Us." Will my city's native species die off and be replaced by invasive, toxic-loving kudzu? The White Christian Nationalists setting ecological policy have abandoned the Bible as their guide. Genesis 2:15, in all versions, clearly states we must tend to God's creation.




# Abdulrazak Gurnah, **Theft**, (Riverhead Books 2025).

Nobel Laureate Abdulrazak Gurnah is a hawakati—-a storyteller —-in the ancient Arab tradition that kept listeners captivated and moved them into another world. Just as Scheherazade told a thousand tales to forestall her death in Arabian **Nights.** Gurnah meticulously begins one tale, deftly leaves it to start another and then has a third and a fourth and a fifth story emerging from a branch of the first. He is dedicated to giving each character their due and his descriptive powers are unrivaled. The story is peopled with women and men we get to know intimately, even if only briefly, like the seductive Englishwoman who creates the peripeteia, the old gardener who knows everyone's secrets, or the "troublesome" father who was exiled after committing the theft that gives the book its name, thus abandoning his child to where "nobody wanted him." Theft follows two generations of Arab Zanzibaris who managed to live through a speedy revolution in 1964 that overthrew a Sultan and led to a what historians called a "massacre of Arabs": violent looting of Arab and South Asian properties and businesses, mass rape of women and children, and the murder of possibly tens of thousands of Arab and Indian civilians. The author and his brother fled to England (coincidentally at the same time as Freddie Mercury—born Farrokh Bulsara—lead singer for the rock band Queen), but his characters stayed on. The insurrection is background for their narratives: a father could no longer tell stories because "a bitterness entered his mind after the revolution;" one girl's barest flirtation with a "hooligan" soldier, a neighbor who was trained in Cuba and came back in time to take part in the revolution, led to her forced marriage to an abusive divorced


man 25 years her senior; a young treasured cousin who joined the new security force of one group of insurgents, ineptly trained and left unarmed, was "cut to pieces" by the other, indigenous, revolutionaries. After the end of the Sultanate, Zanzibar became part of the modern world, joining with Tanganyika to form Tanzania, and the second generation came of age, trying their best to avail themselves of unexpected opportunities and escape the old Muslim familial traditions. But they were still limited: by abject poverty, "there was to be no more school for him, there was no money;" sexism, "men are like that when they wished to please themselves; they go away and give no thought to the misery they leave to the women;" childhood trauma, one young man "wondered why parents like his who were neglectful and unloving bothered to have children," and their own fears, limitations, and egos. Gurnah, following the pattern of those who enthralled their listeners in the shade of a ghat tree centuries ago, offers reflections and lessons about colonialism, social hierarchies, the urban-rural polarization, and the lure of capitalism. He is a feminist, highlighting women's resilience, sisterhood, and ambition without idealizing them in any way. He is an optimist, showing the error of believing "one must endure" a miserable life or that "this is how it was for every [woman]." He is an artist. See how the story ends for these people of the Spice Islands, who are both very differ-

How much has your homeowners or renters insurance gone up?

Note I didn't ask whether it's gone up. With all the claims from wildfires, hurricanes, tornados, and floods and with increases in rebuilding costs, insurance companies have increased homeowners premiums an average of 24% over the past three years, according to the Consumer Federation of America. In Illinois, the three-year increase is 50%, the second highest in the country.

I was shocked when I opened my renewal notice from Country Financial. My premium increased 44% from a year ago!

When I moved into a South Loop condo 12 years ago, Country Financial had the lowest premium I found, even including a mandatory Illinois Farm Bureau membership that amused this urban high-rise resident. Until this year premium increases were reasonable, so I ignored advice to shop around every time a renewal notice came.

After getting the recent Country Financial bill, I solicited quotes from other companies online. The only response was from Lemonade, a digital insurance company that has no storefronts or agents. Its quoted premium was \$181 less than Consumer Financial's for the same coverage.

I'd heard of Lemonade as a highly rated provider of pet insurance, for which its name sounds suitably whimsical. For homeowners insurance, "Lemonade" conveys less gravitas than an insurer with Financial in its name, but the company, which also sells auto and term-life insurance, has earned a respectable reputation in just 10 years of existence.



Lemonade has an A rating for financial stability from credit rating agency Demotech and an excellent rating on TrustPilot. It is *Money*'s pick for best online insurance company.

"Lemonade is an excellent choice for people looking for basic coverage at affordable rates," says financial research website ValuePenguin.

Basic coverage is what I was looking for because I don't expect to have a claim. It's unlikely that my ninth-floor condo would be robbed or that my friends would hold me liable for injuries on the premises. If I have a bad experience, I can change insurers again next year.

An insurance policy without local agents, without any agents, seemed strange to me, but I'm behind the times. People have been banking online since the 1990s. Although Lemonade has a customer service phone number, nearly all of its business is done digitally, even claims, which are made through its phone app.

After I paid for Lemonade's policy, I received a pleasant surprise. I was asked to select a charity from a list of dozens. At the end of every year Lemonade donates money that hasn't been paid out in claims. Maybe it's a marketing strategy, maybe the company has a social conscience — or both — but I like that.

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

# Expanded and Expansive: How the Intuit Art Museum Used A Transformative Renovation to Reinvent Itself

In 1991, a group calling itself the Society for Outsider, Intuitive and Visionary Art declared its mission "to celebrate artists who, for one reason or another, seem motivated by a unique personal vision and demonstrate little influence from the mainstream art world," and made



its entrance into Chicago's art scene with two exhibitions, featuring artists and perspectives now considered essential to the canon of outsider or self-taught art.

"From Chicago," held in late September at Navy Pier, presented work by Henry Darger, Joseph Yoakum, William Dawson, Lee Godie and others. "Thrift Store Paintings," which opened in early December, was a traveling show of secondhand art collected and curated by the L.A. artist Jim Shaw and hosted at Tony Fitzpatrick's World Tattoo Gallery.

The group, including the artist Roger Brown, executive Cleo Wilson and her partner, publisher Bob Roth, along with gallerists Susann Craig, Carl Hammer and Ann Nathan, almost immediately changed their name to Intuit: The Center for Intuitive and Outsider Art. But their overall vision was steadfast from the start. As Roger Brown once put it, "The real reason behind the society was the hope that eventually there could be a museum devoted to this sort of work."

That hope has been realized as the Center reopens on May 23 as the Intuit Art Museum (IAM).

Staying put in the place it has called home since 1999, at 756 North Milwaukee near Chicago and Ogden in River West, the space has been reimagined with a tenmillion-dollar expansion that began in September of 2023, partially funded by five-million dollars from the City of Chicago's Community Development Grant.

Part of the work involved modernizing the late nineteenth-century building and making it ADA-compliant. The main entrance is now flush with the sidewalk and a ramp and passenger elevator have been installed. Emergency exits and stairways are up to code, the bathrooms are unisex, and outdated structures that needed repair have been fixed and updated.

Expanding to three stories and into the building next door, the museum has almost tripled the space for its exhibitions and education programs. There are multiple galleries to showcase the museum's permanent collection of around 1,300 pieces as well as to host special exhibitions.

She recently led the Unsung Community Heroes project for the Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus Foundation.



### AMC Theatres On Why They're Discounting Tickets

"Wednesdays are the slowest day of the week at the box office," so AMC Theatres "hopes a fifty percent discount will shake things up," accounts the Hollywood Reporter. "AMC's maverick CEO Adam Aron began approaching studios about extending Tuesday's discount to Wednesday late last year... Studios have long been pushing Aron and other exhibitors to offer discounted Wednesday prices, but this will be the first test to see whether it can match Tuesday's boon and move the attendance needle."

DOWNTOWN — Chicago welcomed 55.3 million visitors last year, and another strong year is expected, the city's tourism arm announced Thursday at its annual meeting at the Nederlander Theatre.

Choose Chicago said last year's visitor total represented a 6.5 percent increase year over year, with international tourism surpassing 2 million visitors for the first time since 2019.

The rise in tourism was attributed to the city hosting several large special events and conventions, such as the <u>Democratic National Convention</u>, <u>Sundance Chicago</u>, <u>Lollapalooza</u> and the <u>second Downtown NASCAR race</u>. Combined tourism spending is estimated to have reached \$20.6 billion last year, Mayor Brandon Johnson said Thursday.

"We can leverage the success of tourism and hospitality industries to build a future for Chicago that is safe, equitable and thriving for all people in all of our communities," Johnson said. "To do so, we must continue to work together and tell the story of Chicago."

Other achievements cited by Choose Chicago include an eighth consecutive year of Chicago being named "Best Big City in the U.S." by Condé Nast Traveler's Readers' Choice Awards and the newly announced extension of the National Restaurant Association Show through 2032.

The organization reported helping visitors book 2.65 million hotel rooms in 2024. Leaders also said the group secured 49 citywide conventions, including the 2026 NAACP National Convention and the 2028 Grand Conclave of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

On Thursday, Johnson announced the appointment of Guy Chipparoni, president and CEO of Res Publica Group, as the new chair of Choose Chicago's board of directors. Chipparoni will take over for Glenn Eden, who was appointed by former Mayor Lori Lightfoot.

Eden's tenure was defined by the COVID-19 pandemic and the challenges — and triumphs — of reopening the city to tourism in its aftermath.

In farewell remarks Thursday, Eden joked about his appointment by Lightfoot, saying, "I had no idea what the hell I was getting into," but he ultimately expressed gratitude for the opportunity.

"I'm grateful for her, so grateful for her, for this opportunity and to Mayor Johnson for allowing me to continue," Eden said. "You always want to leave something better than what it was, and I feel like I've honestly achieved that during my time as board chair."

Kristen Reynolds, who spent the last decade as CEO of New York's Discover Long Island, delivered her first public remarks as Choose Chicago's president and CEO. She was announced as the organization's newest president last month.

Reynolds said Thursday her vision for Chicago is "simple but powerful."

"We don't just compete; we dominate. We don't just promote the city; we are the city," Reynolds said. "We're the culture, the energy and the heartbeat, and we're going to need that unity and resilience here as we navigate these uncertain times."

# 'Sinners' Has The Blues: How The Box-Office Hit Pays Tribute To Chicago's Music

From references to the Chicago mob and the Pullman Company to a scene-stealing cameo by blues legend Buddy Guy, Ryan Coogler's vampire horror film pays tribute to the Windy City.

CHICAGO — There's a scene in Ryan Coogler's new film, "Sinners," that defies time and space as it floats through musical genres and captivates characters on the screen.

Sammie (portrayed by newcomer Miles Canton) is strapped with his 1932 Dobro resonator guitar and asked to play a song for the crowd at his cousins' vibrant new juke joint.

After a stint in Chicago, Sammie's twin cousins, Smoke and Stack (a dual role played by Michael B. Jordan), have just opened Club Juke in Clarksdale, Miss. Sammie's performance is a pivotal step that can help the twins make a name for the club and help Sammie move beyond his reputation as the preacher's son and become Preacher Boy, the aspiring blues artist.

As Sammie belts the lyrics to "I Lied to You," a song about loving the blues, bodies sway, the heat turns up and a portal opens as the music creates a channel for dance styles and music genres of past, present and future to merge.

"There's something about the blues where it's much more immediate and gets you in the guts," said Tony Mangiullo, owner of Chicago blues club Rosa's Lounge. "If you ask people how they relate to it, they say they relate to the honesty within it and it being genuine."

Guts are spilled in "Sinners" — both figuratively and literally — as an Irish vampire (played by Jack O'Connell) is taken by Sammie's soulful performance and wants to steal his talent. A night of joy and freedom winds its way into chaos before ending in Chicago with a scene-stealing performance from blues legend Buddy Guy.

"Sinners" is a tale of family, love, loss, racism and the search for peace in a wicked world.

But it's also a love letter to the blues — a genre founded in the Mississippi Delta before making its way to Chicago, where musicians like Guy "electrified the genre and demanded attention and strength," Mangiullo said.

If "Sinners" was always planned as an ode to the genre, there isn't a way it couldn't have included Chicago, not when legends like Guy, Little Walter, Howlin' Wolf and Muddy Waters — who spent his youth in Clarksdale — came to Chicago and "created the standards" for the blues we know today, Mangiullo said.

At times, Chicago is just as much a character in "Sinners" as the scene-stealing actors.

"When I think about the Great Migration, Chicago and Chicago's Black communities, the blues is there," said Peter

Alter, chief historian at the Chicago History Museum. "It's part of Bronzeville. Later on, post-World War II, it's part of the greater South Side and the West Side. From the birth of the blues in the '20s to present day, the blues is so much a part of the fabric of Chicago that it makes sense that it would be a backdrop or a sub-theme of the film."

### 'The Fabric Of Chicago'

1930s Chicago sneaks its way into "Sinners" even as the story glides through Clarksdale.

Twins Smoke and Stack return to their Southern hometown in 1932 after working, and causing chaos, for Chicago's Irish and Italian mobs.

"There were feuds throughout that entire time period that could turn violent," Alter said. "That would definitely make sense with what we know of Chicago organized crime in the late '20s and early '30s."

When we're introduced to Mary — Stack's former beau, portrayed by Hailee Steinfeld — the two have a heated discussion at a segregated train station. To travel to Clarksdale, Mary and other passengers traveled via Pullman Company train, as seen on a train cart in the background.

Founded on Chicago's Far South Side, the Pullman Company was integral in transporting Black people from the South to the North during the Great Migration.

Many Mississippians traveled on train lines that ran through the state up to Chicago. The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, a labor union also known as the <u>Pullman Porters</u>, was the first all-African American union led by Black men and women.

### 'The Real Blues Brother'

As "Sinners" reaches its denouement, the blues and an electric performance from Guy emerge as the clearest link to the Windy City.

# Breaking: Columbia enrollment declines 11% from fall, but more transfer students stay after their first semester

Columbia's spring enrollment is 4,952 students, an 11% decrease from 5,570 students in the fall 2024 semester. The college lost roughly the same percentage between fall and spring after the seven-week part-time faculty strike in 2023.

While the percentage of first years who returned in the spring was down 1.5%, the college kept more transfer students, with a 3% increase.

New students in Spring 2025 were lower than they were in Spring 2024, with 94 new students this spring compared to 136 new students last spring, according to an email from Enrollment Management sent to faculty and staff on Tuesday, March 11.

"I was very happy to see the persistence rate for transfer students being up pretty decently compared to the year before," Derek Brinkley, associate vice president of Enrollment Management, said in an interview. "I think it just points to a lot of the work we're doing here to ensure that students have the best experience possible."

Brinkley said that the college has been working on marketing efforts to create a "direct outreach" to prospective students through high school counselors and community colleges.

Columbia will also be creating a "student success" center sometime in 2026 as a result of receiving a state grant, Laurent Pernot, Columbia's chief of staff, told the Chronicle.

"Not only will it be a space, but it's also bringing several departments together to better support students," Pernot said.

In 2019, before the pandemic, Columbia's enrollment was 6,947, an increase from the year before. It has been steadily declining ever since.

Columbia has unique enrollment hurdles related to the lingering impact of the historic strike in Fall 2023 and a sweeping <u>overhaul</u> of its majors that the Board of Trustees approved in December.

Under that plan, the college eliminated or consolidated nearly half of its programs.

That comes as higher education, in general, is facing a looming enrollment crisis and now new threats from the Trump Administration over DEI efforts.

With lower birth rates after the 2007 recession, there are now fewer college-age people graduating high school. Demographers predict that this so-called "demographic cliff" will hit colleges and universities this fall and with full force in Fall 2026.

College enrollment across the board had already fallen 15% between 2010 and 2021, according to the National Center for Education Statistics.

The college has been holding Admitted Students Day every Saturday since Feb. 22 to entice students to come. Students

who are accepted at Columbia have a chance to tour campus and meet with faculty.

Brinkley said that 46% of admitted students have already sent in their deposit for the fall semester, noting that Admitted Students Day is a key event for the college to get prospective students familiar with campus.

At a Faculty Senate meeting on March 7, Faculty Senate President Rojhat Avsar, associate professor in the School of Communication and Culture, told attendees that applications are up but not enough to offset the drop from the previous year.

Indiana Perl, a prospective student from Fort Wayne, Indiana, attended Admitted Students Day on March 8. He wants to pursue music production and noted that there was not much of a music scene in his hometown, which is why he is considering Columbia.

"I mean, it's just a great city for art and music, which is what I wanna really focus on," Perl said.

For prospective student Giuliana Mendez, Columbia's fashion studies program piqued her interest. While touring, Mendez got to learn about the variety of different art majors at Columbia.

"I got to look more into the fashion part of things and also see fashion students, I kind of imagine it would be a really competitive and kind of scarier environment to be in," Mendez said. "They actually all seem really friendly and welcoming, and they seem to like work together and collaborate a lot too."

Prospective student Kate Hammond from Hoffman Estates, a suburb outside of Chicago, is interested in the design management major, in addition to a minor in photography or film at Columbia. She said she hopes to be in the city for school because of the ability to make connections with other creatives. *Additional reporting by Vivian Richey*.


